Slowly, I learned not only Spanish but the language of every one of the children I cared for. It was inspirational to see these children whose disability gave them a good excuse to not learn, chatting with each other and myself easily. I had been making excuses for not trying all these years and here were a group of disabled eight-year-olds showing me how important communication really is. It made me want to learn Spanish so that I could express my personality in the way that they had learned to do.

And so, every day I would go to work for 8 hours, come home and spend my evenings studying Spanish. I loved the thrill of recognising a new word. When I arrived I spoke nothing but when I left I could happily have a conversation. I changed my degree from History to Spanish language. My life was going in a completely different direction, and I'm sure I'm happier than I would have been if I hadn't changed course. That is what I learned from those children – that dedication to communication can open doors like nothing else. Doors to friendship and happiness, to excitement and adventure. Just don't tell my dad that he was right....
